Defence Aviation Safety Authority – Publication of Form 155 - Acceptance of Alternate Artefacts

DASA wishes to advise that Form 155 is now available to process the Acceptance of Alternate Artefacts in accordance with DASR M.A.201(g) / M.A.304(d).

The purpose of Alternate Artefacts is to take advantage of the recognition agreements between DASA and other airworthiness authorities, in cases where the services cannot be procured via the use of existing Airworthiness Recognition agreements.

Applicants for Acceptance of Alternate Artefacts should review Advisory Circulars AC 004/2018 and AC 008/2018 for more details on the use of Alternate Artefacts and DASA Airworthiness Recognition framework.

DASR Form 155 is the final step in the application process and should be submitted in an application pack with the appropriate supporting evidence. DASA may request additional information from the applicant to support acceptance of this application.
